

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



Starting in November 2016, we welcomed Batch 27 to our new home.

We remain forever grateful to past supporters. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Father Agatho's Farm in Bogor and Medco Foundation for the beautiful Maleber Plantation, both of whom who made the first eleven years of our journey possible by allowing us to start and build TLF into what we are today.



Notes from Our Co-Founders

The Learning Farm said goodbye to its comfortable home on **MEDCO** land in Maleber after 8 years, and moved to a beautiful new piece of land just a 15-minute drive away from where we were.

The 2.4 hectares were specially bought and leased to us by a long-term supporter, who prefers to stay anonymous. Now we had to take on the challenge of building a brand new farmhouse, one that would meet our growing need for space due to increased demand, and with a separate girls' dorm. We were very lucky to have **RED CROSS SINGAPORE** generously donate most of the money we needed for this massive new build.

"It takes a village to raise a youth", as they say, and we have been very blessed to get support from everywhere and everyone: our architect, contractor, an absolutely active and engaged board, a long list of donors many of whom have pledged to be our Founding Partners, volunteers, well-wishers and our extended community which is really like our extended family built up over the years. Most of all, our amazing staff are to be commended for keeping two farms going simultaneously, and for making the transition seem so seamless that the school never had to close down, nor the students suffer. True professionalism! With each change come challenges as well: but we are stronger with each hurdle. There will be the teething problems of a new property, and there will be daily hurdles and roadblocks to test us. But with each



challenge overcome, our team gets stronger and our program more resilient and time-tested.

We graduated our 786th youth in **November 2016**, and are proud to say we now have 25 percent young women. With each cohort we also have started to take in refugees from our partner UNHCR.


Our program has never been stronger. And we thank every one of you for that.

When we first heard about The Learning Farm in 2015, our interest piqued. Our brand new farmhouse construction progress.

2016 marked the start of the new-farm construction process. With the help from an architect, Ibu Janto Notonegoro, the U-shape structure consisting of 3 buildings slowly took place over the year.

Building A is in the center and is the only two-story building. The ground floor houses the main office, classroom, main hall and students' dining room.

The first floor consists of the staff quarters, computer lab and library.

Building B, located on the left of the building project, has been earmarked as the boys' dormitory. The dormitory has the capacity for 46 beds. At the very end of this building are two separate rooms which have been designated for a laboratory, tool shed and storage area.


Building C, located on the right wing, has been designated as the girls' dormitory, kitchen, and staff dining area. The girls' dormitory can accommodate 24 people.




Even though the building was not fully finished by the end of September, it was necessary to start the moving-in process because the lease in Maleber had come to an end. Refurbishment of the new building was done as we prepared to welcome the new batch of students in November.

The refurbishment of the facility was made possible through the support of our friends and donors. Mulia Keramik donated floor tiles for large areas of the building; Bapak Yoghes Dixit donated granite for the main hall flooring; Ibu Dina Farida Iskandar donated the tiles for the kitchen and the staff dining area; Ibu Yasmin Wirjawan helped with the new stoves and tiles

for the staff quarter and office and finally, Pak David Yaory provided the labour cost for the tiling work.

We were also very fortunate to receive help from other supporters who helped to furnish the building. LDS Charities provided us with all the lockers, office common table, computers and learning tables as well as dining tables for students and also an additional kitchen sink. Samsung kindly donated various electronic devices, including a big screen TV for the classroom, refrigerators, washing machine and air conditioners, and the wife of the Korean Ambassador donated a laptop and projector.





Muhajirin came to TLF with a recommendation from his school in Aceh. The school is a boarding school that planned to make an organic garden. Four youths were sent from the school to TLF. And yes, after the completion of his program he went back to the school and started an organic garden.

Muhajirin has now been transformed into a person who values education. While working in the garden during weekdays he continued his studies in Serambi Mekah University majoring in Information Technology. He understood that the unemployment figure was high and he saw many people whom had degrees but were still unemployed. So he decided to beat the competition by attaining a higher education.

With persistence he finally had his bachelor degree at the end of 2016. Luckily for him the school promoted him to an Administrative Officer. Congratulations Muhajirin!

Cherry Wahyudi, Batch 6

Cherry, who was a rebellious teen spent one year of his life in a juvenile detention facility in Boyolali. He was then taken to a foundation where he heard about the

TLF program. He was interested in learning about organic farming when he heard about the program. In his village the farmers all used chemicals.

He enrolled in 2009. At that time, the program ran for six months. He then continued for another six months in the advanced program. Because of his excellent progress he was then hired to assist in administration. He was introduced to accounting and finance which tickled his interest.

Cherry continued in his high school acceleration program (Kejar Paket C) during his employment at TLF. One and a half years later he received a scholarship from his foundation to enrol in a diploma program at University of Gajah Mada University in Yogyakarta. He studied accounting as his interest in this field had grown over the time he spent working at TLF.

He got his Diploma at the end of 2016. Cherry was happy that his life was back on track because of TLF. Learning accounting did not mean his passion for farming was forgotten. While studying he worked on a piece of 300 m² land that belonged to one of his fellow alumni. There was a group of seven that cultivated the land organically.

Apart from the shared organic farm each of them had their own separate farm as well. Cherry admitted however that it was cultivated conventionally as organic products did not yet produce a sufficient profit. Cherry later got a job in marketing at a motorcycle dealer in Boyolali.

Yohanes is originally from Flores and enrolled at TLF in 2011. He was recommended by a foundation with the agreement that he had to work with the foundation for two years after he returned from TLF, they would then give him a scholarship to continue his studies in university.

After working for six months he resigned from the job because he wanted to continue his studies right away. There were not many choices of higher education institutes in Flores. Therefore he set off to Makassar and got a job as a security guard at a bank to finance his studies and living costs.

He initially intended to study agriculture to complement what he had learned at TLF but there were no courses suited to his working hours. He finally took Biology in STKIP, Pembangunan Indonesia, Makassar. He graduated as a qualified Biology teacher in December 2016.

Rahmat Sulfajri, Batch 23

Sulfajri is from Makasar, South Sulawesi. He was recommended to TLF by an organisation called Sahabat Pulau in 2015. His learning at TLF taught him to be independent. It inspired him to pursue his education to a higher level.

After completing his program with TLF he enrolled at STIE/ STMIK, Jayakarta in Jakarta. It is a diploma program and his study is in Information Management. He is in his second semester now.


He does not want to depend on his parents to finance his studies. Using his skills in design he works at a startup venture that produces hair treatment oil. His job includes designing the logo as well as marketing the product utilising a partnership with barber shops.


Not only that, he has a good sense of business. He lives in a South Sulawesi dormitory where many other people from South Sulawesi stay. He invested in a coffee shop there and receives some income through profit sharing. He is really happy and excited about the work that he is doing. He is confident that he can manage his time by juggling study and work.

Dos Santos (Piter), Batch 9

Piter is originally from Ambon. He heard about TLF from an alumni who was impressed with his experience there. Following this advice he joined in 2010, although it was not his original intention. To his surprise Piter learned a lot and his awareness was broadened.

He worked in Bangka, Belitung for a while but then returned to Jakarta. He then got a job at the airport in Tangerang in cargo security. He decided to continue his studies in university majoring in Information Systems in 2013. It is his final year and he is expecting to graduate next year.





Isep Awaludin, Batch 8

Isep received information about the TLF program from his village office. It was in 2010 when the TLF team came to conduct direct recruitment. He was interested and was interviewed right on the spot. Farming is what he usually did but organic farming was entirely new.

His knowledge from TLF opened up an opportunity for him to work at the Green School in Bali. During his employment there he wondered why most farmers were computer illiterate and under valued by most people. He worked there for two years then returned home to farm the land at a foundation.

In 2014 his original observations about farmers and IT literacy came back to him from when he was in Bali. He decided to enrol in a diploma program in Sukabumi to study Information Management. He wants to be a farmer with knowledge. He wants to change people's mindset about farming. He is in his last semester and is looking forward to starting his own farming business.

Simson Dombo, Batch 14

Simson, who used to be called Iyan is from Poso, Central Sulawesi. His study at TLF in 2012 made him love farming so much he wanted to further his education in farming. He is now studying in his eighth semester in Sintuwu Maroso University (Unsimar) majoring in Agro Technology in the Faculty of Agriculture.

Iyan wants to confront the notion that farming is only for farmers' sons. He wants to prove that farming is a privileged career. He is active at the campus assisting the lecturers in any projects they have. The computer skills he learned at TLF have been very helpful. He now doesn't have to pay tuition fees because the work that he does for his lecturers covers his tuition fees.


In his final year research project Iyan discovered a method to grow lettuce in hotter climates by modifying the growing environment. Iyan observed that there were no lettuce produced in Poso as the weather is too hot. Therefore he sees a potential business in producing them if his method can be applied successfully.

Ambrosius, Batch 10

Being a victim of the East Timor referendum conflict, Ambrosius struggled hard to finish his high schooling in Semarang, Central Java. He believes that education is important in one's life.

When Ambros finally graduated from high school he got distracted and his life took a wrong direction. He worked at a small sewing factory for nine months but got fired for a huge disagreement with his employer. Rage consumed him and he planned to put an end to his ex boss' life. He owned a blade and learned black magic. He found a forensic book that taught him how to leave no evidence when committing a crime. He planned to carry out his plan on 11/11/11. Ambros lived on the streets and successfully joined

a mafia scam defrauding health insurance companies. The scam involved going in and out of hospitals and claiming health insurance. But that business was tough. He got caught once and the insurance company blacklisted him. He then continued to wander the streets, joining a network of street crime while waiting for his grand plan to be executed.

Ambros realised that he was on a steep moral decline. His most degrading experience was when he was given rice that was supposed to be fed to a dog. It crushed his heart and he felt lower than the dog. During these dark days he would buy fries and crumbs for IDR 2,000, cover them in chillies and then drink a lot of water in the hope of feeling full.

One day a TLF alumni from Yogyakarta, called Santo, visited the orphanage and shared information about TLF. Ambros was interested and thought, "God, if you want to make me a good person then please do." He then departed for TLF by train with the money for the ticket lent to him by the orphanage.

The first few weeks at TLF were very difficult and he kept thinking about running away. However, through persistent guidance and mentoring by the facilitators at TLF he was brainwashed (his own term) in a good way. For the first time in his entire life he was treated as a human being and slowly the scar to his dignity was healed. The message from a mentor that kept surfacing in his memory was "You have another chance to learn and succeed in a different place". At TLF he realised that God had a grand plan for him. Upon his completion of the basic program an opportunity for a new chapter in his life opened up when a job vacancy was offered to the best graduate. He was ranked second and was offered a job at PT Hextar Seed (owned by our donor, Pak David Yaori). He remembers this new beginning so well - June 6th, 2011 and he soon forgot his mission for 11/11/11. However he still had a dream to study. With the support of his employer he studied Management in Bandung Raya University. He paid the tuition fees

himself and successfully managed his time between work and study. His dream to pursue a higher education has been accomplished - he recently obtained his bachelor degree in Management at the age of 28.

Through hardwork, integrity and dedication he has gained his dignity back. There have been many speed bumps in his life but each has made him richer in experience and a lot wiser. "I always try to honour the good name of TLF and my employer in all my actions. If I do well there will be more chances for my fellow alumni to get good opportunities in their lives." said Ambrosius seeing himself as a role model.

Wiguna Jaelawijaya, Batch 23

Wiguna is from Tasikmalaya, West Java. He was a casual labourer who once had the chance to study in university but had dropped out in fourth semester as he could not afford it anymore. He was then introduced to TLF by an organisation called Sahabat Pulau.

At TLF he learned about farming from scratch. It was totally different from what he had imagined. He thinks

that farming could be a profitable profession if you learn about it properly. "Farming with a system could give you a greater income than you would get if you were working for the government," he said. He made that statement after his time with Joglo Tani in Yogyakarta.

After graduating from TLF Wiguna wanted to continue his studies. He heard about a scholarship program offered by Joglo Tani. He is now in his second semester in University Janabadra, majoring in Agricultural Business. He took evening classes so that he could still farm while learning at the Joglo Tani network.

He does many activities in Joglo Tani. He plants vegetables, takes care of ducks, grows seedlings, does verticulture, takes care of the fishery and undertakes thesis surveys for other university students. He even has a large role in the Pertamina CSR Project in collaboration with the Joglo Tani network. His role is to introduce farming to elementary students around Yogyakarta.

He sees those activities as his advanced learning. His long term goal is to go back to his home town in Tasikmalaya and practise what he has learned so far. He wants to be a farmer with a good system, farming with style!





Message from A Beloved Volunteer, Phun






Our Residential English Volunteer from Australia

New Projects at the New Farm





At this meeting we discussed how best to move the Alumni chapters forward.

There are six alumni activity centers each with its own coordinator: Semarang, Batang, Ciamis, Malang, Bali and Lombok. Each of these activity centres works in different business areas and TLF's function is to provide strategies when they face challenges. It was decided that TLF will monitor each unit to make sure all these six units are doing well in achieving their goals.



Adventurous Journey with the International Award for Young People (IAYP)


International Award for Young People (IAYP) aka The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award, supports young people who want to contribute to their community and achieve their full potential. TLF has been an award unit of the Award since 2015. Together with the Award, in 2015 we have launched a special project called "Empowering local Leaders." Through this special project we have engaged local schools and our TLF students. Currently, there are 12 TLF students

and 8 students from SMP An-Nissa participating in the award and started the journey for Bronze Award. One of the requirement for the Bronze Award is an adventurous journey for 2 days and 1 night. So, in early June 2016, we went to the Citamiang camping ground in Tugu, Bogor. It was a great experience for our youth to embark on an adventure there. They learned resilience and team work, and learnt from a local community who plant organic coffee and produced delicious honey from forest bees.

Ibu Sisca and Pak Hendri attended the farewell lunch representing P.T. Tenggara (tea plantation). We also had the Village and Religious Heads attend, the latter came to pray and give us blessings for our new endeavour. Moving out from






